WRESTLING

Wrestling is the sport of two unarmed opponents grappling with one another and by body grips, strength, and adroitness trying to secure a fall, pinning the opponent's shoulders to the floor.

One of the most primitive and universal of sports, wrestling was probably known to prehistoric man. In ancient Greece wrestling was rated second only to discuss, throwing in the Olympiads. The Greeks practiced two forms of wrestling, upright and ground.

Wrestling tournaments were held in Medieval Europe, and the sport has remained popular throughout history. Distinctly different styles of wrestling exist today.

Greco-Roman wrestling, most popular in continental Europe, permits no tripping, no holds below the waist, and takes place mostly on the ground. It has no relation to classical wrestling, despite its name, but derives from French wrestling schools.

Free-style wrestling is most popular in the United States, England, and other parts of the world. This form permits tackling, tripping, leg holds, and other rough features and is a legitimate descendant of ancient Greek wrestling.

Two different wrestling styles are popular in Japan--Sumo and Jujutsu. Sumo is quasi-religious in nature, and much ritual is involved. Most of its participants weigh 250 to 400 pounds.

The earliest organized wrestling in the United States was in the Greco-Roman style. Free-style wrestling developed rapidly in popularity among professional wrestlers, but by the end of the 1930's professional wrestling had deteriorated into exhibitions of feigned competition and histrionic performances rather than legitimate athletic contests.

Amateur Athletic Union and National Collegiate Athletic Association hold competitions annually. In amateur wrestling contestants are classified by weight. The contest itself is conducted on a mat 29 ft. square. Three periods, of three minutes each, comprise a match. A fall ends a match. Points are scored during the match for certain maneuvers, and the highest accumulated total wins if there is no fall.

SKIING IN JAPAN

Snow-skiing in Japan is quite different from snow-skiing in the States. Well, maybe the difference isn't the skiing but the environment.

A group of us went up to Ishiuchi and stayed in a farm house that had been modernized into a small hotel. Maybe I should say only partially modernized--the two Japanese toilets were still old-fashioned-no-flushers.

The family and hired help were great. Every morning we'd get scrambled or boiled eggs, ham, tangerines and a gigantic pile of bread--big, thick, tasty slices. Lunch was supposedly eaten somewhere on the slopes, but the dinner more than made up for it. One time they gave us sandwiches first, then salads, steaks, bowls of soup, and finally dessert. For ¥1500 a night, including two meals of such sizes, it's not too shabby, is it?

In addition to all that, as the average Americans, we asked for lots of water at every meal, a toaster, jam or jelly, salt and other little luxuries. One of the employed guys was from college, working for his room and board for a little bit of skiing. He spoke excellent English and he catered to every one of our whims. Everyone went out of his way just to help us. When we went out to another lodge for night entertainment, some of them would stay up to wait for our return. Country people seem to have a remarkable capacity for patience.

But, like average Americans, we had some complaints. Getting out of futons in the morning was a chore. The only heater we had used kerosene; therefore in order not to suffocate, we had to turn it off for the night. Try and imagine getting out of a very warm bed to be met by freezing cold air.

The best way to get out was to jump out at once and start running place until your body heat went down. What torture!

As I said before, the toilets were abominably unflushable, in addition to the fact that the men's and women's toilets were in the same room. Each time the girls went in, they'd clear their throats, start singing or look dumb by saying quite loudly, "Ha, ha; well, ready or not I'm coming; I sure hope no one's in here," etc.

Then when you got in, the smell was just unbelievable! It got so that no one really wanted to go--I'm surprised that no one got a ruptured kidney. One of the strange incidents was that one of our guys' underwear fell into the pit! Don't ask me how he did it!

The bath could fit about four people in a squeeze. It was warm, but since everyone else used the same water (Japanese style), it wasn't too refreshing. Unfortunately, it was next to the bathroom, and as soon as I went into the dressing room after my bath, I nearly fainted from the fantastic smell.

The "bathtub incident" was concerned with three or four of our guys who decided that they would try to sing the latest hits, complete with the washpans for drums. They were so loud that the young helpers turned the sign to the side that said ladies. A lady went into the dressing room, but luckily she was of our group and realized that although the boys had suddenly become silent, they were in there.

Our partial solution was to use the restrooms in an Americanized lodge close to ours whenever we could. Then the guys found public baths in the aforementioned hotel--these were gigantic and had clean running water.

Everything else on our trip was great. There was even night-skiing. The snow did start getting wet near the end of our trip, but at least it waited for the end. And the slopes weren't crowded until the last day. I wouldn't mind doing it all over again(excluding the bathroom and bathtub).

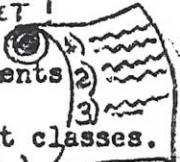

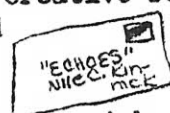

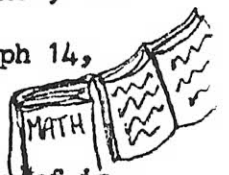
